# How is our "Living" impacted by Christianity?

Biblical instructions are both specific and general. While specific instructions are straightforward, general instructions/principles involve application to our times & culture. Applications of general instructions & principles are applied for the entire church body and also for individuals.

Important questions when applying Biblical principles:

- What pleases the Lord?
- What's the best way?
- What's the safest way?

## How does Christianity change my actions?

• Our actions please God rather than grieve Him (Colossians 3:17, Ephesians 4:30)

We respect that God is watching our lives.

## • Our actions regard our bodies as temples of the Holy Ghost

*1 Corinthians 3:16-17* Do you not know that you are the temple of God and *that* the Spirit of God dwells in you? <sup>17</sup>If anyone defiles the temple of God, God will destroy him. For the temple of God is holy, which *temple* you are.

*1 Corinthians 6:18-20* Flee sexual immorality. Every sin that a man does is outside the body, but he who commits sexual immorality sins against his own body. <sup>19</sup>Or do you not know that your body is the temple of the Holy Spirit *who is* in you, whom you have from God, and you are not your own? <sup>20</sup>For you were bought at a price; therefore glorify God in your body and in your spirit, which are God's.

We respect the body that is now the temple of God.

## • Our actions are above accusation

*1 Peter 2:11-12* Beloved, I beg *you* as sojourners and pilgrims, abstain from fleshly lusts which war against the soul, <sup>12</sup>having your <u>conduct</u> honorable among the Gentiles, that when they speak against you as evildoers, they may, by *your* good works which they observe, glorify God in the day of visitation.

We accept the responsibility of honorable conduct.

### • Our actions impact others

*Romans 14:12-13* So then each of us shall give account of himself to God. <sup>13</sup>Therefore let us not judge one another anymore, but rather resolve this, not to put a stumbling block or a cause to fall in *our* brother's way.

*1 Corinthians 8:9* But beware lest somehow this liberty of yours become a stumbling block to those who are weak.

We respect that others are watching us.

### • Our actions don't give place to the devil

*Ephesians 4:25-27* Therefore, putting away lying, *"Let each one of you speak truth with his neighbor,"* for we are members of one another. <sup>26</sup> *"Be angry, and do not sin"*: do not let the sun go down on your wrath, <sup>27</sup> nor give place to the devil.

*1 Peter 5:8-9* Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil walks about like a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devour. <sup>9</sup>Resist him, steadfast in the faith, knowing that the same sufferings are experienced by your brotherhood in the world.

We recognize spiritual vulnerability.

## • Our actions don't give place to sinful humanity

*1 John 2:16* For all that *is* in the world–the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life–is not of the Father but is of the world.

We recognize human vulnerability.

## Actions that differentiate Christians from today's society

• Christians practice self-discipline (I Corinthians 9:25, Galatians 5:23, 2 Peter 1:5-9)

Discipleship means a disciplined life.

- Christians speak truth (Ephesians 4:25, 28)
- Christianity changes our language (Ephesians 4:29, 31; Matthew 12:36-37; James 1:26)

We are careful with our words. We control our tongues. We pay close attention to what we say.
